Work to Begin on N-2, 10th St. to Old Cheney Rd., Lincoln

Weather permitting, work is scheduled to begin the week of May 2 on N-2 from the Van Dorn Street intersection east to Old Cheney Road in Lincoln, according to the Nebraska Department of Roads.

Constructors, Inc., of Lincoln, Nebraska, has the \$10,141,200 project. The 4.4-mile highway improvement project will consist of pavement repair, bridge rehabilitation, curb ramp construction, milling and new asphalt overlay. The majority of the construction work will take place during nighttime hours from 7:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m. Monday through Friday, and on weekends from 6:00 a.m. Saturday to 6:00 a.m. Monday. During nighttime hours, segments of N-2 will be closed to traffic, and weekend work will take place under single-lane closures.

Truck traffic will be routed around N-2 for the duration of the project via I-80, US-6 and 84th Street. Through traffic will be detoured during the overnight closures via I-80, US-6 and 84th Street. Local traffic detours will be in place to route traffic around closures. Access to local businesses will be maintained during the construction. Bridge repair work will be performed on two bridges concurrent with the pavement repair work. Lane closures for the bridge rehabilitation work will be in place 24 hours a day, 7 days a week until the bridge work is complete. The highway improvement project is anticipated to be completed in October.

The Department of Roads' project manager is Brian Schoen of Lincoln. Motorists are reminded to drive cautiously through construction zones and watch for signs and detour routes, as they will be changing as the project progresses.


